My Golden Rock

It is with great pleasure and a real sense of nostalgia that I describe my experiences during my formative years growing up in Golden Rock during the 1950s and the 1960s until I migrated to Australian in October 1969. I emphasise that these reflections are purely my personal experiences and may not be totally accurate or comprehensive. I emphasise that this article is based on Golden



Rock itself and not personally on me or my family, although there might be the odd reference to my family. I was about a year or so old when my parents moved to Golden Rock from Cochin in Kerala State, after my Father was discharged from the Indian Army and took up a position in the Public Works Department in the Southern Railways. Dad was a Finger Print Specialist (monitored, reviewed and investigated the operations of PWIs) and Mum was a trained School Teacher.

Golden Rock is one of the four zones of the district of Tiruchirappalli in Tamil Nadu (then Madras State). Prominent areas in Golden Rock were the Central Railway Workshop and its residential colonies for its employees, the Divisional Hospital, Saint Joseph's Catholic Church, Saint Peter's Protestant Church, the English Medium School, the Tamil Medium School, the Railway Institutes, and the Central Jail. Of course the Rock itself couldn't be missed and brings back many fond memories of the excitement we had as children, climbing the Rock.

Golden Rock was a vibrant thriving town primarily occupied by Anglo Indians. Most adult males worked for the South Indian Railways while the adult females were either school teachers, nurses, stenographers or worked for the Post and Telegraph offices. In the 1960s, Bharat Heavy Electricals (just outside Golden Rock) also offered employment to many people.

The postal abbreviation for Golden Rock was 'GOC'. We often joked that this stood for "God's Own Country". Neighbouring areas were the private quarters of Ponmalaipatti and Kottapattu.

Prior to the 18th century, Golden Rock, was referred by Robert Orme to the British as Sugar-Loaf Rock, where after the Battle of Golden Rock, Tiruchirapalli (then Trichinopoly) was divided into two parts, one called the Cantonment, which contained the residences of European & Anglo-Indian community and the garrison-barracks for stationing the European and Indian Regiments. The Cantonment then comprised Tiruchirapalli Junction, Senthaneerpuram, Varahaneri, Golden Rock, and other major parts of southern and eastern Tiruchirapalli.

Around the 1920s, provision was contemplated for a Railway School since there were considerations to move the railway workshop from Negapatnam to Trichinopoly. Foundations were laid in 1926 and the workshops permanently moved in 1928. Around the same time, two Railway schools at primary level in English Medium and Tamil Medium were established during 1923 and 1925 respectively.

Post-independence the administration of the schools were transferred to the Indian Railways, which opened many more such schools, where quality education was provided at a subsidised cost of about one Lakh children of railway employees and about 30,000 non-railway employees.

Under the British rule, the school initially served the purpose only for Europeans and British children, they then extended entrance to Anglo-Indians and finally exclusive to the families of Railway employees who served anywhere in India. Now, this school has been elevated to Higher Secondary School.

Key Places of Interest

The St. Joseph's Church: The St. Joseph's Church with its gigantic spires, has an impressive and majestic appearance, situated opposite to the historic Armory gate of the railway workshop. The founder and main architect of the church was the late Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph Alphonse de Rozario. On 30 March, 1930 the church was dedicated to him. The Anglo-Indian community, workers of railway workshop and the Indian families gave a part of their wages and also collected funds to build the church.

I have many cherished memories of attending weekly Sunday Mass, First Communion services, Confirmation services and other religious ceremonies at St Joseph's church with my family and friends. Masses were said in Latin where the Celebrant faced forward with his back to parishioners; and we couldn't receive Holy Communion in our hand as we do today.

I was a regular Alter Server at Sunday Mass, and made sure that I obeyed my Mother's rule that I only wore long sleeved shirts to church.

Christ the King Chapel: This was a private chapel built by the late Griffy Gonsalvez. It was built on his private block of land that housed the Bosco Mill, his private residence and a small rental home. The Mill was open to the public at a minimal cost. Most residents took their grain to be milled at this mill. Griffy Gonsalvez had the Chapel blessed and consecrated to operate under the control of Saint Joseph's Catholic Church. During my time, it was only used on special occasions.

<u>Society of the Divine Word Chapel (SVD)</u>: The SVD Order were a missionary order whose focus was to spread Christianity across the world. The late Father Karl Ritz, SVD was the first Chaplain posted to start up a Mission/Seminary in Golden Rock. I think the year was around 1963/64.

At that time there was a large block of land (around 10 acres) just beyond the cemetery which originally belonged to the Godain Family. We referred to is as Godain's Farm.

I am not absolutely sure how a group on Catholic nuns were located there and ran a small farm growing primary produce. Fr Ritz rented a small cottage from the Nuns and used it as his residence while the Nun's prayer room was used as his Chapel. Again I am not exactly sure how I came into contact with Fr Ritz, but I played a vital role in being the language translator between the Nuns and himself. The SVD order subsequently purchased a large portion of land from the Nuns and Fr Ritz built the centre up as a residential Seminary. Most Anglo Indians who lived in the private quarters attended Mass at this new Chapel.

Saint Anthony's Chapel: This little chapel was constructed with mud bricks and a thatched roof at the base of the Rock and among many other similar huts where many less fortunate people lived. Many Catholics attended the Novena held in this chapel every Tuesday evening.

Hindu Temple: The Hindu Temple was erected on the eastern side of the Rock and was a prominent landmark in Golden Rock. It was the main centre of worship for the Hindus who conducted their religious ceremonies there on a regular basis. On key feast days, they conducted huge processions around the temple and surrounding streets.

<u>Cemetery</u>: This was the main Christian cemetery which was located at the southern end of Golden Rock's private quarters. I well remember the cemetery buzzing with activity particularly on 'All Souls Day' where beggars lined the street to seek alms from the visitors.

There were a set of two Hangers adjacent to the cemetery which were large high roofed metal buildings with extensive concrete surrounds. These Hangers were unused at the time and served as a great playground and bicycle track for us.

<u>Central Railway Workshop</u>: The central workshop was set up in 1897 by the South Indian Railways at <u>Nagapattinam</u> to maintain steam locomotives. They subsequently decided to move the workshop to Tiruchirappalli. The foundation stone of the Tiruchchirappalli workshop was laid by Mrs. R.P. Munro on 20 December 1926, and work was completed in 1928.

The workshop housed state-of-the-art facilities, including a powerhouse which generated electricity for the workshop and the colony. Golden Rock's railway colony was one of Tiruchirappalli's first locations with electric lighting.

The workshop primarily maintained coaches and diesel motors and heritage steam locomotives and manufactured wagons. It also maintained and repaired Royal Air Force aeroplanes during World War II.



A key feature that reminds me of the workshop is its Buzzer (we called it the buzz) which blared out three times before 7:00am, three times before 1.00pm and again at 5:00pm. No one ever complained about the very loud blaring noise that echoed across all of Golden Rock

I well remember Mr Hole (an Englishman) who was the Chief Engineer and General Manager of the Workshop. He committed suicide in his home on 11 November, 1953.

Divisional Railway Hospital



The Divisional Railway Hospital was set up in 1927.

The hospital was located amidst the Railway Quarters, near the Railway Workshop-and the Sunday Shandy. Established by the South Indian Railway Company, it was the oldest hospital in the Southern Railway zone – older than

the Zonal hospital at Perambur, which was constructed in 1928. This hospital was part of Indian Railway Medical Services, which maintained a large network of hospitals – 56 divisional and 9 zonal. Many Anglo Indians were employed in various positions in the hospital and even more received medical treatment in the hospital. Mrs Williams was the Matron of the hospital (head of the nursing staff) until she

Mrs Williams was the Matron of the hospital (head of the nursing staff) until she passed away, when Miss Petty Gonsalvez took over the role of Matron.

<u>Child Jesus Hospital</u>: Child Jesus Hospital was located on the main Cantonment Road in Tiruchy. It was a private hospital which was set up and operated by an order of American Nuns. Most Anglo Indians who were prepared to meet the private costs of the hospital used it. I don't remember too much more about this hospital. All three of my siblings were born there.

<u>Sunday Shandy</u>: The Sunday Shandy (Farmers' Market as we call it here) was a great community market place where families purchased their green groceries, grain, casual clothes, casual footwear, and live poultry (chooks and ducks mainly). The market was originally established during the British rule in 1926 and was run every week thereafter.

It was set up to the East of the Railway Hospital and alongside the Senior Nurses' and Doctors' quarters. I well remember my Father riding home after weekly shopping with live chooks and/or ducks hanging from his bicycle handlebar.

<u>Schools</u>: A list of the schools and colleges at that time were: Railway Mixed Middle/High School, Campion High School. Saint John's Vestry High School, Holy Cross Girls Higher Secondary School, St. Joseph English Medium School, Infant Jesus English Medium School, St. Mary's Matriculation School. And the prominent institutes of tertiary education were Saint Joseph's College, Holy Cross College, Seshasayee Institute of Technology and Jamal Mohamed College.

I do not remember much of my pre-school days or the first couple of years of my elementary schooling. I certainly remember Grade 3 where I was in a mixed gender class in the Anglo Indian Railway School. At that time this school was only a Middle School (up to Year 9).

The principal and staff were largely all female. It was a co-education school which was established, managed and run exclusively for Anglo Indian families who were employed by the South Indian Railways.

The Teachers I remember are: Miss Rosie Beale (Head Mistress), Mrs Ismai Rodrigues (Deputy), Miss Dennis, Mrs Carroll, Mrs Dorothy Gonsalvez, Mrs Phillys Goulding, Mrs Doris Rozario, Miss Janette Vernum, Mrs Stevens, Mrs Katheleen D'Monte (Music), Mrs Stella D.Cruz, Mrs Williams, Mrs Augustus, Miss Sundram (Tamil), and a male Tamil Teacher (I cannot recall his name).

We referred to all the teachers as 'Miss'. And I must admit that there was pin drop silence in the classroom when Miss Beale walked through the verandah.

After Year 9, most male students went to Campion High School, while female students went to Holy Cross Girls Convent while some went to Saint John's Vestery which was a co-education school.

<u>Railway Colony</u>: We lived in a 'F Type' house (a type/class of homes built for rental accommodation of railway employees) where around 90 % of the families were Anglo Indians. The house was small when compared to what we are used to here in Australia,

with an entrance veranda, a living room, a bedroom, a kitchen, and an outside bathroom and a separate toilet and a small enclosed back yard. Although we had a small backyard, my parents raised chooks, ducks, turkeys, and a dog.

Most of the children walked to school and back home in groups having fun and mucking around along the way. We certainly enjoyed a care free life where we all played together irrespective of age and/or gender. The most important part of childhood was to have fun and muck around with all the other children.

Note: All 'F' type homes in the railway colony in Golden Rock were the same as our home. There were also smaller railway homes around Saint Joseph's church which were called 'C' type and 'D' type houses. There were some larger homes to the north ('H' type and 'G' type homes) which were allocated to higher ranking railway officers.

Railway Station: This was a typical railway station in the northern end of Golden Rock. As far as I remember there were about four platforms linked by a steel overhead bridge. I have many fond memories of using the trains to go to Campion High School and back.

Air Port: When I was in Golden Rock, the Airport was known as the Tiruchirapalli Airport which provided air services primarily to Sri Lanka. I understand that it is now a busy International Airport.

Bus services: There were three public Bus services from Golden Rock to Tiruchy - TVS, TST & Ex-Servicemen which were used extensively for out transport requirements.

The Jail: The Tiruchirapalli Central Jail was located in the far west of Golden Rock. For obvious reasons its operations were not mentioned or discussed often. As a very young boy, I had the opportunity to visit the Jail with my parents who were invited there by the Chief Medical officer, the late Dr Darryl Rodrigues who was my Mum's first cousin. I vaguely remember seeing men dressed in striped loose fitting overalls attending to the gardens, undertaking domestic work in the houses, etc.

The 'Bandy Stands': Who could forget the Golden Rock 'Bandy Stand'. This was the bullock cart terminus which was the prime mode of transport for frail adults and/or sick children. There was a similar bullock cart terminus outside the Golden Rock railway station which served as the main transport for passengers arriving by train. There was the occasional passenger transport cart which was drawn by a horse.

<u>Social Life In the Railway Colony</u>: The "F type' railway colony was built in a line of six attached house in a row. There were four sets of these houses that formed a large square. The space in the middle served as excellent make shift hockey field, football field, rounders (base ball), playing with our 'tops', and so on. Christmas time was the best time of the year. A large marquee would be erected in the open square where all the social activities were conducted from 24 December to New Year day each year. It was a wonderful time of the year for Anglo Indians, with sports and games, children's rides, dances for adults and so on.

<u>In Franklyn Club</u>: To the best of my knowledge, the Franklyn Club was built in the early 1960s. It was funded by the National Anglo Indian Association headed by Mr Frank Anthony. It was built in Ponmalaipatti on private land. Both my parents served on the AI committee in Golden Rock, which meant that we were regular patrons at the Club. Here again, Franklyn club was the hub of social activity for Anglo Indians; the prime time being around Christmas and the New Year.

<u>In the Railway Institutes</u>: There were two Railway Institutes in Golden Rock. One was on the route to Saint Joseph's Catholic Church, and the other was nearer to the Railway Station. Although the institutes were a legacy of the British rule, Anglo Indians were extensively involved in the activities conducted there; primarily wedding receptions, boxing matches, billiards and snooker. There was also a movie theatre in the Institute near the railway station.

Other - <u>Butcher Shops</u>, <u>Bakery</u>, <u>Dairy Shop</u>, <u>Pork Butcher in Tiruchy</u> (<u>Masingput</u>) There were four butcher shops near the Rock (linked back to back) that catered for the supply of beef for Christians, while mutton had to be purchased from another source in the market place in Ponmalaipatti.

And of course, pork and authentic pork sausages were only available from the specialist pork butchers in Marsingput (Tiruchy). These pork sausages were soo popular that Anglo Indians from around the State would crave for it. Not far from the butcher shops was a Bakery which supplied bread, baked fresh every day and home delivered. This bakery also baked our traditional Anglo Indian cakes at Christmas time.

Conclusion: There is soo much more that I remember about our growing up days in Golden Rock and surrounding areas (Tiruchy in particular) that I like to talk about if I have the opportunity, but I'll save it for another opportunity.
